Mayor Onderko's Corner

The month of August is a good time to provide a financial update since tax bills will hit mailboxes after the budgets have been approved for the school district, County and our municipality. First however, I am disappointed to inform you that New Jersey is now the least fiscally sound state in the United States. In a recent report we are now ranked dead last, 50th out of 50 states, mainly due to inadequate payments to the public workers' retirement system.

There is a huge gap between what the state sets aside each year for pensions and retiree health care benefits and what those obligations actually cost. New Jersey's pension system is among the worst-funded in the nation, with more than \$135 billion in unfunded liabilities. That could result in higher state taxes in the future to help resolve the fiscal crisis and unfortunately that will affect all of us.

The good news is we have been focused on getting our local financial house in order for the municipality's budget with the ultimate goal to stabilize the tax burden for the services we provide. We adopted a balanced 2017 municipal budget, paid down outstanding town debt and grew the

surplus for carry over into the 2018 budget cycle. All steps in the right direction to help stabilize property taxes and to put you, the taxpayer, first!

This was a major accomplishment given the fact we have lost tax ratables with Blue Acres buyouts and encountering increased obligations for pension and health care insurance payments we send to Trenton. In addition, Manville's school district received much needed additional aid, \$741,268, from the State Department of Education. This aid could help offset a large 5.5% increase in the school district's budget for the 2017-2018 school year. I'm happy to have spoken out about unfair school funding and how the existing formula hurts a town like ours. I hope this additional aid will provide immediate tax relief this year.

To help keep the valuation of our tax-base in line with market conditions, we have agreed to enter into an annual reassessment program to reassess 20% of the town each year on a rolling 5 year basis. Manville will be the 16th town of the 21 in Somerset County to do annual reassessments. Somerset County tax officials believe by annually adjusting tax values, it is the best way to guarantee a fair property tax system and help better manage our town's cash flow by reducing successful tax appeal refunds.

Therefore, starting later this summer, inspectors from our local Tax Assessor's office will be inspecting 20% of the town each year. More information will be provided in the weeks ahead on our Borough web site, www.manvillenj.org.

Helping keep Manville affordable for all residents who desire to live in our community is a top priority as our state faces significant financial challenges in the months and years ahead. We will continue to do our part to help stabilize taxes.

From the DPW Director's Office...

This year marks the 30th anniversary of the enactment of the New Jersey State Mandatory Source Separation and Recycling Act. All residents are asked to please keep all recyclable materials out of your trash.

In Manville, bulk items and yard waste will be picked up curbside throughout the year on the scheduled days. Please refer to the Borough website for the pickup dates and the various guidelines. (www.manvillenj.org)

Municipal (household) waste is collected once per week for the various sections of the Borough in accordance with Ordinance #2008-1073. Municipal waste for disposal should be placed curbside by 7 a.m. on the scheduled collection day and no earlier than 5 p.m. the evening before.

Household garbage guidelines include using the appropriate container:

Trash Cans: 45 Gallon Maximum Capacity with a maximum weight of 40 pounds with a lid or cover and two sturdy handles.

Plastic Bags 35 Pound Maximum
Weekly Limit Either 3 Bags or Cans per Household

Household garbage must be free of:
Hazardous Waste, Paint, Medical Waste, and all types of Recyclables.
Any bag/can containing such items will not be picked up.

HOLIDAY SCHEDULE Please refer to the Borough calendar or website for the rescheduled collection date (www.manvillenj.org) during holidays.

Compliance with these guidelines is mandatory and will be enforced in accordance with Manville Ordinance #2008-1073.

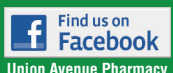

Four Reasons Not to Feed Wildlife

Feeding wild animals, whether on purpose or not, does more harm than good



We know they're cute and they might seem hungry, but feeding most wild animals (with a few exceptions) just isn't a good idea. Here's why.

1. "People" food isn't good for animals. Human foods aren't nutritious enough for animals and may cause serious health problems. A deformity called "angel wing" is commonly found in ducks, geese, swans and other waterfowl who are fed white bread, popcorn, crackers, or other people food. (This doesn't mean you can't feed ducks and geese; you just have to identify areas where feeding waterfowl is supported, and offer the birds the right foods. Look for waterfowl feed or duck pellets at feed stores. Other healthy foods include seedless grapes cut in half, shredded kale, Swiss chard or romaine lettuce, and grains, including wheat, barley and oats. Make sure anything you feed is bite-sized to avoid choking hazards.)

2. It makes wild animals lose their natural fear of people. Feeding can make large, potentially dangerous animals become too comfortable in residential or recreational areas. Once animals learn they can panhandle for food, they can become a nuisance—or even worse, a safety risk.

3. Feeding wildlife from or near vehicles is dangerous to animals, people, and property. Animals can be hit by moving vehicles or might try to enter vehicles in search of food. In Yosemite National Park in 1998, more than 1,100 vehicles were broken into by black bears—causing more than \$630,000 in damages.

4. Wild animals who depend on people for food can cause injuries or spread disease. When wild animals gather for food handouts, it can cause crowding and competition. These unnatural conditions increase the chances of fighting and injury among animals. It can also increase the spread of diseases, some of which may be transmitted to pets and humans.

Manville Announces Annual Re-Assessment Program

Due to the rapidly changing real estate market of the past several years, the Borough of Manville has decided to enter into an annual reassessment program.

This program will consider the current real estate market and potentially update assessment values each year instead of a costly full revaluation program every 10 to 15 years. This program has been successfully implemented in several Somerset County towns and has shown greater accuracy of assessments which ensures a fair and equitable distribution of taxation across the town.

This program requires ongoing inspections of all properties every five years to confirm the details of the assessment records. Commencing in the summer of 2017, inspectors from the local Tax Assessor's office will be inspecting 20% of the town each year.

Where is my Property Tax Bill?

As of July 22, 2017, the tax bills were still "on hold" because the Manville School Board is set to meet in public on July 25th to discuss the fate of the \$741,628 in additional school aid that is being distributed from the State Department of Education (see Mayor Onderko's article on page 11.) Once a decision has been made by the School Board on how the additional funding will be addressed in its budget, the Somerset County Tax Administrator will certify the new tax rates and the Borough of Manville will get to work on printing the tax bills. We expect tax bills to be delivered by the second week of August based on the above. All residents will be given the full amount of time to pay their tax bill.

SENIOR FARMERS' MARKET



VOUCHERS AVAILABLE AT THE LIBRARY

SCLSNJ's Manville Library branch is distributing Farmers' Market Vouchers to eligible Seniors. The Seniors Farmers' Market Nutrition Program (SFMNP) is a federally funded program to help low income Seniors gain access to farm fresh produce while simultaneously supporting the local farmer.

Qualified seniors will receive \$25 worth of free vouchers (\$50 for a married couple) to buy NJ fresh produce at participating farmers markets in Somerset County.
