**What is the Current Situation?**

- The Somerset County Department of Health continues to actively respond to the coronavirus pandemic.
- As of July 17, 2020 -
  - CDC is reporting a total of 3,555,877 cases of COVID-19 in the US, and a total of 137,864 deaths.
  - NJDOH is reporting a total of 176,551 cases and 13,710 deaths.
  - Somerset County has a total of 4,518 cases and 473 deaths. Residents can call 908-231-7111 for an automated reading of the current coronavirus (COVID-19) case count in Somerset County, NJ. ## Where can I get tested?

- Contact your healthcare provider for guidance pertaining to your individual health symptoms.
- Somerset County in collaboration with Raritan Valley Community College will be holding a COVID-19 drive-thru testing site on Thursday July 23, from 10am – 1pm at Raritan Valley Community College, 118 Lamington Road, Branchburg. Patients must schedule an appointment for testing. Appointments can be made online at <https://somerset-hunterdon.adlabscovidtest.com>. Residents without computer access or wishing to schedule an appointment for children ages 5-18 are may call the Somerset County COVID-19 testing information line at 908-203-6014. The information line is open Monday-Friday, from 9:00am – 1:00pm, not including holidays. **Anyone holding an appointment who needs to CANCEL is asked to email [coronavirus@co.somerset.nj.us](mailto:coronavirus@co.somerset.nj.us), so we can accommodate as many residents as possible.**

<b>April 29</b>	In effect at sunrise on Saturday, May 2 <sup>nd</sup> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Reopen state parks and golf courses</li> <li>• Restores authority of county governments to open or close county parks</li> </ul>
<b>May 14</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Non-essential <b>construction</b> can restart effective 6:00am on May 18<sup>th</sup></li> <li>• Non-essential <b>retail stores</b> can reopen for curbside pickup effective May 18<sup>th</sup></li> <li>• <b>Drive-Thru and Drive-In events</b> are permitted immediately under social distancing guidelines</li> <li>• <b>Beaches, boardwalks, lakes, and lakeshores</b> to remain open with social distancing measures in place effective May 22<sup>nd</sup></li> </ul>
<b>May 15</b>	Effective May 26 <sup>th</sup> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Resumption of <b>elective surgical</b> and other invasive procedures</li> </ul>

<b>June 26</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Absent a change in public health data, public schools will open for in-person instruction and operations in some capacity at the beginning of the 2020-2021 school year.</li> </ul>
<b>June 26</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li><b>Indoor dining*</b>, <b>outdoor amusement parks, outdoor water parks, playgrounds, museums, aquariums, libraries and indoor recreations facilities</b> to open on <b>July 2</b> – with safeguards in place</li> </ul>

<b>July 15</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Guidance will be released that will allow the parents or legal guardians of pediatric, developmentally disabled, and intellectually disabled residents of long-term care facilities to arrange for by-appointment visits with their loved ones: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Outdoor visitations will continue per the Department of Health’s directive issued prior to Father’s Day</li> <li>Indoor visitations will be allowed at facilities which have had zero new probable or confirmed coronavirus cases recorded in a 28-day period</li> </ul> </li> </ul>

Private schools with longer academic years will remain closed until at least June 30. On May 26, Governor Murphy announced that New Jersey schools will be able to hold outdoor graduation ceremonies that comply with social distancing, effective July 6.
  - On June 26, 2020 Governor Murphy announced, absent a change in public health data, public schools will open for in-person instruction and operations in some capacity at the beginning of the 2020-2021 school year.

- Effective midnight, June 24, 2020: New Jersey, New York and Connecticut today announced a joint incoming travel advisory, effective at midnight, that **all individuals traveling from states with significant community spread of COVID-19 quarantine for a 14-day period** from the time of last contact within the identified state.
  - On June 30, Governor Murphy updated this advisory – **visitors to NJ from the following states are advised to observe a 14-day self-quarantine: Alabama, Arkansas, Arizona, California, Florida, Georgia, Iowa, Idaho, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, Nevada, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Utah.**
  - On July 7, the travel advisory was expanded to include the following 3 states: Delaware, Kansas and Oklahoma.

## Preparing Individuals and Communities

- Everyone should follow general guidelines for hand hygiene and for preventing disease, as noted in the [“How Can I Protect Myself from the New Coronavirus?”](#) section above.
- Monitor yourself and your family members for symptoms of COVID -19. Mildly ill patients should be encouraged to stay home and contact their healthcare provider by phone for guidance about clinical management. Patients who have severe symptoms, such as difficulty breathing, should seek care

immediately. Older patients and individuals who have underlying medical conditions or are immunocompromised should contact their physician early in the course of even mild illness.

- You should continue to social distance – this means keeping about 2 arms’ length between you and other people.
  - Face coverings are now required in outdoor public spaces when social distancing is not practicable. \*Exceptions for individuals eating/drinking at an outdoor dining establishment, when wearing a mask would inhibit health or safety, or individuals under 2 years old.
